Sunday, June 15 2025, 08:19PM,

On the above date and time, Officer Van Engen, Officer Meyer and I, Officer William Kunkel, were dispatched to [REDACTED]. We were dispatched to this residence for the report of a male subject having a [REDACTED] due to a reaction from his prescription [REDACTED] medication. The caller, identified as [REDACTED] [REDACTED] (referred to as [REDACTED] from here on), identified the male subject as [REDACTED] AMANDO E LANG M/W 07/27/2000 (referred to as AMANDO from here on). It was also reported that AMANDO may be hallucinating.

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While responding to the residence, dispatch advised that AMANDO had a warrant for his arrest through our department. The warrant was for retail theft and AMANDO needed to post \$376.00 or serve 7 days at the Milwaukee County Jail.

When I arrived on scene, I met with Officers Meyer and Van Engen. They advised me that AMANDO was arrested by the Greenfield Police Department in 2019 for 1st degree intentional homicide (See case #19-24028). AMANDO was charged by the Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office with 1st Degree Intentional Homicide (2019CF003856).

Officer Van Engen, Officer Meyer and I approached the residence. Officer Van Engen spoke with [REDACTED] via phone and was able to have her escort AMANDO to the courtyard of the apartment complex. I immediately observed AMANDO making what appeared to be involuntary movements or ticks. I also heard AMANDO make a screeching sound. I believed AMANDO was acting this way because he was actively hallucinating. Due to AMANDO's demeanor, the department's previous history, and the active warrant for his arrest, AMANDO was handcuffed immediately and taken into custody. AMANDO was searched and secured in the rear passenger seat of Officer Van Engen's squad car.

I remained with AMANDO and spoke with him. My conversation was meant to keep him calm until officers could determine the correct course of action for the call. Officers Van Engen and Meyer interviewed [REDACTED] For details on that interview please review Officer Meyer's supplemental report.

I asked AMANDO what occurred. AMANDO admitted that he recently took his medication and also smoked a cigar. I asked AMANDO if there was anything in the cigar and he stated he did not know. I advised AMANDO that I was concerned about his health and was not trying to get him into trouble. AMANDO advised me that the cigar was a Dutch cigar and that it contained nicotine. I asked AMANDO if he took a different medication than normal prior to smoking the cigar and he stated he did not. I asked him if he may have taken his medication twice on accident and he stated he did not. AMANDO reiterated that he did not know why he was feeling the way that he was. AMADNO described the way he was feeling as a bad trip. AMANDO also mentioned to me that he felt like he was blacking out from time to time. It should be noted, while speaking with AMANDO I did notice he appeared to nod off from time to time.

I advised AMANDO that I overheard he had been doing well since he was released. AMANDO stated he believed this was the first negative reaction to his medications since he had been taking them. I asked AMANDO where he was residing and he stated it was at a group home but he could not tell me what the address was. I asked AMANDO if he was released on an agreement that he could be out as long as he took his prescription medication and AMANDO agreed with my statement. AMANDO also mentioned that he was just visiting the residence today.

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While continuing to make conversation with AMANDO, he randomly asked me if I had ever shot someone. I advised AMANDO that I had not and that I had no stories like that to tell him. AMANDO then laughed.

Officer Meyer asked me to ask AMANDO if he wanted to go receive mental health treatment. I asked AMANDO if he wanted to go to the hospital or to a mental health hospital. AMANDO felt that he needed medical and mental health treatment. I asked AMANDO if he wanted to receive mental health treatment at the Mental Health Emergency Center(MHEC) and he requested to be transported there. AMANDO and I also discussed his health and wellbeing and possibly needing to be assessed by the Greenfield Fire Department.

It was ultimately determined that AMANDO could be transported directly to MHEC. Any medical needs that AMANDO may have could be addressed by staff. If we arrived and that were not the case, AMANDO could then go for a medical clearance.

Officer Van Engen conveyed AMANDO to MHEC and I followed. AMANDO was voluntarily admitted without incident.

████ came to the Greenfield Police Department and posted \$100 for AMANDO's warrant. The paperwork for the new court date was provided to █████

NARRATIVE

On the above date and time officers were dispatched to [REDACTED] in the City of Greenfield. The caller [REDACTED] [REDACTED] called 911 and reported [REDACTED] [REDACTED] AMANDO E LANG, DOB 07/27/2000 was having a [REDACTED] due to a reaction to his meds. Officers also learned AMANDO had a valid commitment with our department for retail theft. Due to the prior history with AMANDO officers determined we would remain outside and have [REDACTED] attempt to bring him out to us. A short time later [REDACTED] escorted AMANDO out of the residence and walked him towards us. I asked him what was up and he reacted with some type of tic. He jolted forward similar to a boxers shuffle and made a high pitched vocalization. [REDACTED] held him back and calmed him down. Officers also verbally calmed AMANDO down and moved in to place him into handcuffs due to his unpredictable behavior. I placed AMANDO in handcuffs. I checked for proper fit and safety locked them. I conducted a search of AMANDO and located a lighter in his right side pocket. It was turned over to [REDACTED]

During this time [REDACTED] told is they were having a fathers day gathering. [REDACTED] stated he was taking medication and has been very good with it. [REDACTED] stated he had not acted this way in years. [REDACTED] was explaining he had smoked a cigar and did not drink at all. I escorted AMANDO to the back of a police squad. He asked that we do not put him in foster care. He was placed in the back of a squad and asked if he felt okay for a second, he stated "yeah".

I went back to where Officer Van Engen was speaking with [REDACTED] They were discussing some of the prior case and his release. [REDACTED] was stating AMANDO was not attacking anyone today and he was concerned for himself. She explained he was diagnosed with [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] [REDACTED] stated he is taking medications for all these conditions and is religious about taking them. [REDACTED] stated the cigar was a flavored one and she observed it come out of the package. She was asked if he added anything to it or cut it open and [REDACTED] stated no. She explained he knows not to do that because he knows he will have to go back in. [REDACTED] offered to contact his social worker during this time but had trouble reaching anyone. We learned from [REDACTED] that ARMANDO stays at a group home on the south side of Milwaukee and he can come and go as he pleases as it is not a secure facility.

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Officers confirmed with AMANDO that he was willing to go to Milwaukee Mental Health Emergency Center. Officer Kunkel spoke with AMANDO and soon confirmed AMANDO did want to go voluntarily. Officer advised [REDACTED] of the payment amount for his commitment with our agency. AMANDO was transported by other officers and I cleared from this complaint.

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
